Annual Association Meeting August 6 10:00 am at the Pavilion:

Monthly LSA Board Meeting:

The monthly LSA Board meetings are scheduled for the 1st Monday of the month at 6:30 pm in the pavilion. Please come and share your ideas! Also see the President's report on page 6.

Indian Lakes Boating Regulations:

- 1. Absolutely no visiting watercraft are permitted on our lake.
- 2. There shall be no high speed boating/jet skiing or in other words no wake for the entire lake before 11:00 am and after 8:30 pm. Note: this also applies to fisherman.
- 3. When any watercraft has a person or persons in tow in any fashion, a spotter must be present on the tow-craft as proscribed by Michigan law.
- 4. All watercraft must stay a minimum distance of 100 feet from all other boats and objects as proscribed by Michigan law.
- 5. All traffic must be going in a counter-clockwise fashion around the lake.
- 6. The launch is for association members only. Only watercraft with appropriate stickers will be allowed on this lake.
- 7. The appropriate stickers must be applied to all trailers at the boat launch.

These rules have been established for the safety of all members and will be enforced.

Boaters please be aware of wakes created near shorelines. They take a huge toll on seawalls!

Pow Wow Point:

There's a new sign for swimmers & parking boats. The intent is to keep swimmers safe. Please beware when boating around there. There are lots of swimmers this year.

Pavilion:



There is a flat \$50 rental fee payable to the Lake Shores Association plus a separate \$50 cleaning deposit payable to Tammy for the use of the pavilion. Dues must be current for members to able to rent the pavilion. The pavilion can be reserved for your personal event by contacting Tammy Williams at 231-629-1877 or by completing and submitting the Pavilion Rental form on our website. The two separate deposits (rental and cleaning) must be paid to the treasurer 2 weeks in advance of your planned event at the Pavilion.

Please note that the cleaning deposit will be forfeited if fasteners such as tape, nails, wires, paperclips, and screws are used to attach items to walls, ceiling, or windows. Smoking is not allowed in the pavilion – smoking in the pavilion will also result in the forfeiture of the cleaning deposit.

Fish:

The board encourages all fishermen to practice the custom of catch and release. Please be respectful when fishing around docks and boats.

We have volunteers willing to build a spawning habitat for our walleyes. More information on this process will be available later.


John Westveer has resigned from the Architectural Committee. We sincerely thank him for years of dedicated service. Thanks John!

2011 Water Treatment To Our Lake:

The Tentative Treatment Schedule for 2011 is as follows:

The notice that LSA members received from PLM contained the following statement.

"DEQ permitting restriction, national holidays, and/or weather conditions may influence the timing of treatments throughout the 2011 season. PLM treats each lake according to a schedule or season plan, established with the cooperation of your lake association, lake board, or residents on the lake. The treatment schedule is approximate. Please watch your shoreline for the posting of the 8.5 x 11 inch, yellow or green signs. The signs will indicate the date of the treatment, the product used, and any restrictions on the use of treated water for swimming, watering lawns, etc."

PLM did a a full algae treatment on July 21, treated for some pond weed (especially in the channels), and will be back to treat some mil-foil. That will bring us to our \$15,000 budget.

Presidents Report:

Dog Walking:

Loose Leash Walking Recipe from thethreedogblog.com - provided by Rachel from TheDogTrainingSecret.com Ingredients: Patience, love, lots of deep breaths, steadfastness and attention to detail

- Step 1: Attach leash to dogs collar (preferably a martingale/no-slip or flat buckle)
- Step 2: Wait in front of door you will be exiting until dog sits. Dog will whine, jump and protest; act completely unaffected by the poor manners; dog will eventually give up and sit down; praise lavishly in a high pitched happy voice
- Step 3: Reach for door knob then pause, dog will get up from sit and eagerly go for the door, remove your hand from the knob and stand paying no attention to the dog until he returns to the sit position
- Step 4: Repeat above step as necessary until the dog remains sitting as you turn the knob and begin to open the door just a crack
- Step 5:As the door opens the dog will get up from the sitting position and try to go through the opening; the minute the dogs bottom lifts off the floor shut the door, remove your hand from the knob and pay no attention to the dog until he returns to the sit position; once in the sit position praise lavishly in a high pitched happy voice
- Step 6: Repeat above step as necessary until the dog remains sitting while you open the door completely
- Step 7: Give your dog a release command such as "OK" or "let's go" and take a single step forward; the dog will jerk forward; stand firm and ignore the dog, dog will continue to pull, might walk close to owner but then will immediately dart forward again; wait the dog out, he will usually give a calming signal such as a yawn, lip lick, or sigh and then return to the owner in a silent surrender. Praise the dog lavishly in a high pitched happy voice
- Step 8: Take a step forward and repeat the above step; the amount of time it takes for the dog to surrender will decrease each time until the dog no longer pulls but only if you NEVER let the dog walk even a step until he loosens the leash on his own, without the use of force or coursing by either walking behind the handler or returning to the left side of the handler and waiting.
