Vice President Comments:

What is the Indian Lake Shores Association?

A lake association is a volunteer organization consisting of interested property owners. A lake association is an organization for promoting administration and bringing a community together to form consensus on common goals and objectives. Lake associations are flexible and voluntary. As a result, solutions to lake problems that require large amounts of money usually are not implemented. Membership dues and fund-raisers are the principal means of raising money to fund association activities. Developing a sustainable lake management plan—a plan that will be used and adapted over time—means that the whole community needs to have the commitment and determination to actively protect the lake and its surrounding community.

So the Lake Shores Association is... all of us! We are all members and we all benefit from the services provided. We ask that you reflect on this as your Board struggles with complex financial and services issues in the coming months.

Lake Muck Reducers - Weed Control & Biological Bacteria:

At the November 9, 2013 LSA Board meeting, lake muck control was addressed by Bre of PLM. The Board and meeting attendees found her briefing to be very professional and informative. The Board reviewed the pricing and information of the muck pellets and determined that the muck reducer would be beneficial to the lake and LSA homeowners. PLM will offer a 10% discount <u>and</u> free delivery for group orders received through the LSA.

Members who are interested in purchasing muck pellets through the association should contact Jim Hutchison at 231-648-6481 or by email at president@indianlakes.org. Member orders <u>must be prepaid</u> with a check made out to PLM and either given to Jim or received at the LSA PO Box by April 30 for individual orders to be included in the group order. The order will be delivered in about two weeks.

The available sizes are 10, 40, and 50 pounds:

- 10 lb bucket \$106.00 (with tax) less 10 percent discount comes to \$95.40 final cost
- 40 lb bucket \$371.00 (with tax) less 10 percent discount comes to \$333.90 final cost
- 50 lb bucket \$424.00 (with tax) less 10 percent discount comes to \$381.60 final cost

Members treating 50 ft² of lake bottom will need $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb of pellets per application. The recommended application schedule is for a total of 5 applications - one each month May through September. The total used each year would be $7\frac{1}{2}$ lb, so most people would have plenty with a 10 lb bucket for 50 ft² of lake bottom.

Larger areas may need larger sizes. Bre can calculate the amount of pellets needed for larger areas. Jim has her contact information if members wish to contact her about muck pellets or about PLM managing the lake weeds along their lake front property. Bre in that November meeting also stated that she is happy to work privately with individual lake front property owners with their own lake weed control efforts.

PLM Muck Digestion (MD) Pellets contains a combination of natural, beneficial bacteria, enzymes, and vitamins that stimulate the biological activity on lake and pond bottoms. This stimulation allows the bacteria to feed on the organic sediment, therefore reducing the muck levels. Pellets are most effective when the water temperature is greater than 50°F, and of course, it is necessary to follow label precautions.

Budget Recap:

2014 Estimated Budget: \$30 - \$37,950.00

2013: \$31,730 Main Treatment: Renovate 3

2012: \$29,400 (EWM back throughout entire lake), Main treatment: Diquat

2011: \$14,679 (Residual carry-over from 2010 sonar treatments, OTF / EWM treatment, treated Native Plants)

2010: \$40,905 (Sonar treatment)

2009: \$22,383 2008: \$25,511

A recap of this season and moving forward: Eurasian water milfoil (EWM) is the main exotic species in Indian Lake. We have used a variety of different contact and systemic herbicides in the past to target this species in the most aggressive manner possible. The EWM in Indian Lake is hybrid. It is cross bred with native milfoil strand and formed what is called Hybrid milfoil. In 2010, we targeted all the EWM using Sonar (lake wide). This systemic herbicide did control the EWM during the treatment season and the 1st year post treatment, but the EWM bounced back in year 2-post treatment. Last year, 2012, we used Diquat and this season, 2013, it was recommended that we use Renovate 3. We targeted – 130 acres of EWM using Renovate 3. The goal of the 2013 treatment was to attack the root system so the EWM grows back less dense and we have fewer acres to treat in 2014.
