INDIAN LAKE LAKESHORE ASSOCIATION FROM YOUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS – 2014

SPRING is just around the corner and our Annual LSA Membership Dues of \$150.00 per year are due April 1st.

On behalf of the Board of Directors it is my pleasure to report our progress on "A PATH FORWARD". The board identified the following objectives last September and we have been working on them all winter. **LAKE PRIVACY:** As many of you know, Mr. Chris Chase (the defendant in the LSA lawsuit) passed away unexpectedly in December. It was a tragedy for the Chase Family and we wish to express our condolences again to the extended Chase family. After a delay due to Chris's death, the Board, the Chase family, and our attorneys met with a mediator on February 20th. Now that the mediation has been stopped we will proceed to the next step. There will be a court date in June and the judge will determine the outcome of the lawsuit. WEED CONTROL: In an effort to be cost conscious we will be implementing some new weed control practices this year. Our program will be a combination of chemical treatments (early) and weed harvesting (cutting) later in the summer. PLM has indicated that there is a good chance that the required chemical control will be less after this winter. This is because the longer the ice and snow stays, the more likely that plants will be negatively impacted. The board is very cognizant of this issue and it is our NUMBER "1" commitment to control the weeds for the benefit of the lake to allow the continued enjoyment by our lake community. **BOGS:** Can you say, "bye-bye bogs"? Well, just maybe some of them. The board is looking at cost figures and what we can allot for removal of as many of the bogs as we can this year. Since Bird Island is a permanent fixture of our lake, some of the bogs could be moved to that area.

SECURITY PATROL: For many years, many members have desired security patrols by professional law enforcement – Montcalm County Sheriff and the Michigan State Police. Due to budgetary restraints, pursuits of these services have been placed on the "back burner" for now. (Note: Howard City Police is now combined with the Sheriff Department).

BOAT RAMP ACCESS CONTROL: In the past, members of the Board of Directors and other volunteers have enforced our "members only" access to the boat ramp on the three summer holidays of Memorial Day, 4th of July, and Labor Day. <u>Until budgetary restraints are resolved volunteers are still needed for "boat ramp duty" on the three summer holidays listed above.</u> Please contact Sue or Jim if you would be willing to volunteer - email Sue at secretary@indianlakes.org or phone at 231-648-6193 or Jim at president@indianlakes.org or phone at 231-648-6481. Boat sticker policies and current registration will be strictly enforced and offenders will be reported to the Montcalm County Sheriff.

FISH PLANTING: The Board is being advised by active fishermen about issues such as the quantity, species, and timing for the spring planting. We are also looking into what the potential fish kill is going to be due to the horrible winter - see "Potential Fish Kill This Spring" page 4. Then we will be better able to determine what we need to plant this year.

ADDITIONAL PARK MAINTENANCE: The board is working on a small budget, if possible, for the cleaning and improvement of our parks. Volunteers can help us with projects in many ways. If you are interested in volunteering to work on one of the parks, please contact Vice President Brenda Tumosa and sign up to serve on a work party.

AND IN CLOSING.....

As a board we are pleased with our progress on these items and trust that you, as LSA members, concur. We wish to thank all who participated in the two "dues increase" votes. Although a significant majority voted in favor on each occasion, neither vote satisfied the LSA legal requirements for passage. With the votes behind us, the board has worked hard to find ways to provide the services desired. To do so, the board has tentatively approved the budget for the period of April 1, 2014 to March 31, 2015. This budget also provides for the satisfaction of our legal fees over multiple years.

The Water's Edge:

Pike, bluegills, bass, and other fish spawn in the shallow water along our lakeshore. That same lakeshore is also important to many species of birds such as loons, ducks, and cranes because they nest along its banks. Therefore, our shorelines provide an essential habitat for the fish and wildlife that live in our lake.

Unfortunately, overdeveloped shorelines cannot support the fish, wildlife, or clean water that are so appealing to those of us who live at the water's edge. Bit by bit, the effects of lakeshore homeowners "fixing up" their property are destroying fragile lakeshore habitats.

"Clean" lawns actually make for dirty lakes when owners of lakefront properties strive for the look of a golf course or a sandy beach. Homeowners tend to apply traditional landscaping practices to their lakefront properties. This type of landscaping, however, creates problems for our lake and its inhabitants.

"Green water" is just one example of these problems. A mowed lawn sends rain runoff carrying fertilizers, pet waste, and lawn clippings into the water where they "fuel" algae blooms and contribute to the formation of the muck that we attempt to reduce by using muck pellets and other chemicals.

It is ironic that most property owners buy their lots because they enjoy nature and then unknowingly harm its habitat by altering the natural landscape. Most species of fish and wildlife cannot thrive in a water's edge bordered by sandy swimming beaches and mowed lawns.

What can you do? Switch from mowed lawns and plant native grasses, shrubs, trees, and wildflowers. Along the shoreline, add sugar maples, bur oaks, cranberries, and dogwoods that are all good for wildlife. Avoid using pesticides or fertilizers that contain harmful chemicals that can leach into the lake. Pesticides kill beneficial insects living in shoreline vegetation that are important foods for fish, birds, and other wildlife.

Did you know? One pound of phosphorus fertilizer can produce 500 pounds of algae! Fortunately, most lawn and garden supply outlets offer phosphorus free lawn and garden fertilizers.

Lake Muck Reducers - Weed Control & Biological Bacteria:

At the November 9, 2013 LSA Board meeting, lake muck control was addressed by Bre of PLM. The Board and meeting attendees found her briefing to be very professional and informative. The Board reviewed the pricing and information of the muck pellets and determined that the muck reducer would be beneficial to the lake and LSA homeowners. PLM will offer a 10% discount <u>and</u> free delivery for group orders received through the LSA.

Members who are interested in purchasing muck pellets through the association should contact Jim Hutchison at 231-648-6481 or by email at president@indianlakes.org. Member orders must be prepaid with a check made out to PLM and either given to Jim or received at the LSA PO Box by April 30 for individual orders to be included in the group order. The order will be delivered in about two weeks.

The available sizes are 10, 40, and 50 pounds:

- 10 lb bucket \$106.00 (with tax) less 10 percent discount comes to \$95.40 final cost
- 40 lb bucket \$371.00 (with tax) less 10 percent discount comes to \$333.90 final cost

• 50 lb bucket \$424.00 (with tax) less 10 percent discount comes to \$381.60 - final cost

Members treating 50 ft² of lake bottom will need $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb of pellets per application. The recommended application schedule is for a total of 5 applications - one each month May through September. The total used each year on would be $7\frac{1}{2}$ lb, so most people would have plenty with a 10 lb bucket for 50 ft² of lake bottom.

Larger areas may need larger sizes, and Bre can calculate the amount of pellets needed for larger areas. Jim has her contact information if members wish to contact her about muck pellets or about PLM managing the lake weeds along their lake front property. Bre also indicated that she is happy to work privately with individual lake front property owners with their own lake weed control efforts.

PLM Muck Digestion (MD) Pellets contains a combination of natural, beneficial bacteria, enzymes, and vitamins that stimulate the biological activity on lake and pond bottoms. This stimulation allows the bacteria to feed on the organic sediment, therefore reducing the muck levels. Pellets are most effective when the water temperature is greater than 50°F, and of course, it is necessary to follow label precautions. The Muck Pellets can be ordered directly from PLM's website but you will not receive the discount or free delivery. Potential Fish Kill this Spring:

LSA board members recently received the following from PLM: "PLM, along with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), are very concerned about the current conditions of our area lakes. The long cold winter has produced very thick ice and dense snow pack for an extended period of time. When this happens, sunlight is unable to penetrate down past the ice layer stopping the vital process of photosynthesis from occurring. Without photosynthesis, plants stop producing oxygen, which is essential for a healthy fishery. A lack of oxygen under the ice can produce a "winter kill" of the fish populations in extreme circumstances. Water-bodies that are shallow and have sediments rich in organics (muck) are more at risk for a winter kill."

SPRING IS COMING!!

The time is coming for us to think about getting our watercraft ready to launch

All watercraft need to have the new blue stickers attached and remove the old stickers. If you need a sticker, please call or email Sue Guigelaar (231-648-6193 or secretary@indianlakes.org). She will set up a time to



meet you after the weather breaks to take care of your watercraft. We want to sticker kayaks, paddle boats, sailboats as well as pontoons, motorboats, fishing boats and jet skis. When we sticker your watercraft, we need to see your registration to prove that the craft belongs to you.

The stickers are a security system for both you and the association. If we find a watercraft floating around in the lake, we can get it back to the launch and identify who it belongs to so it can be picked up. Sue has a master log started to keep track of the stickering system.

The Sheriff's Department Boat Patrol will be making more frequent visits to the lake to check registration (MC) numbers. We advise that you have them current and that you carry a copy of your registration on board just like you do in your motor vehicles. This will prevent you from getting ticketed. Those of you who have a registration dated 2014 should check them for expiration. They usually expire on the last day of March. Hoping to see you all when spring finally arrives.
